1. A Family **Grief** (Genesis 49:29-50:14)

50:1-3 – Israelites and Egyptians both mourned for Jacob.

Charles Swindoll writes, "[If] the pyramids and mummies are any example, the Egyptians had developed a sophisticated system of embalming. After the physicians had completed the unique process, which took forty days, and after the people had mourned his passing for seventy days, the funeral procession began its long journey to Canaan."

2. A Forgiving Grace (Genesis 50:15-21)

v.19-21 - "Do not be afraid, for am I in God's place? And as for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good in order to bring about this present result, to preserve many people alive. So therefore, do not be afraid; I will provide for you and your little ones." So he comforted them and spoke kindly to them."

3. A Final Glory (Genesis 50:22-26)

Not even a great man is indispensable. Charles Wesley said, "God buries His workmen but carries on His work."

Applications for Today:

- 1) Thank God that He promises to use all things in our lives (good and bad) for our good and His glory. See Romans 8:28.
- 2) Refuse to remain bitter when bad things (or sinful, wicked things) come into your life. Bitterness only makes it worse for you. See Hebrews 12:15.
- 3) **Trust in God, Who can turn tragedies into triumphs.** Joseph trusted God while lonely, forsaken, mistreated and in prison. God turned Joseph's story around. As long as we are still on this earth, He can turn our tragedies into triumphs. *If circumstances do not change, we can still trust Him Who does not change.*

Extra: Joseph is seen as a "type" (or a foreshadowing) of Jesus Christ:

- 1. Both favored and loved by the father.
- 2. Both hated and rejected by brothers.
- 3. Both conspired against for silver.
- 4. Both condemned though innocent.
- 5. Both exalted to preeminence.
- 6. Both provided salvation for all, not just his own people.
